Dear Timothy C.,

Amid so much chaos, distress, loss, and uncertainty, God continues to work through our ministries in profound and life-changing ways. Every day, we see so much that is outside our control and problems we cannot solve. But what we can do, and what we do best, and what God has called us to do—teach, inspire, and encourage current and future Christian leaders—is making a significant difference for the refugees and many others we serve, who are struggling to survive in Myanmar and in the borderlands.

Being the keynote speaker, who was scheduled to give the charge to the

graduates at the Kawthoolei Hope Theological Seminary (KHTS) commencement, I was also invited to conduct a special two and half day seminar for the 33 MDiv. and Master of Ministry students (pictured above). At the request of the school president, Dr. Wado, my topic was "Spiritual Strength under Stress." He wanted me to spiritually prepare the graduates in anticipation of the many, many challenges and hardships awaiting them once they dispersed to their fields of service.



I had no idea that the seminar would turn out to be one of the most powerful experiences I've had as a teacher since I started serving in Thailand three years ago. Session after session, I could see in their faces, hear in their voices, and perceive in their questions and responses that God was touching them in deeply meaningful ways. They were receiving something their hearts and minds were thirsting for, and their joy and gratitude spilled out into every conversation.

Separately, I was also invited to teach New Testament Theology for 19 Kawthoolei Karen Baptist Churches (KKBC) Bible school teachers from multiple schools along the Thai-Myanmar border. Nearly every one of them is illprepared to teach their assigned courses due to little or no opportunity for advanced level academic training. Thus, they deeply appreciated studying in such depth, even for such a short time, and getting access to the 170 page, single-spaced, Student Guide and my books, some of which have been translated into the Karen language.

I cannot overstate the tremendous value of these kinds of seminars for the refugees, especially for those who serve as community leaders, ministers, and teachers in the Bible schools. This is not me saying they need it. It's them saying, verbally and nonverbally, over and over again, **"We need and want to learn more about God, to be better educated, and to know how to apply the spiritual truths of the Bible to our personal lives and communities more effectively."**



The three young adults pictured above serve as teachers at the smallest refugee camp with the fewest resources. They valued the opportunity to learn so greatly, they were willing to sneak over the border at night, pass through multiple military checkpoints, and ride motorbikes for two days each way.

Sadly, during one of the break times, I learned that, after a year of being extensively vetted, the two Karen men had been approved for resettlement to the USA, only to have their permission suddenly and inexplicably revoked in January. Saw Lwei (on the far right) actually had a plane ticket in his hand when he got the news not to go to the airport. When he told me, I felt sick to my stomach and could barely stammer out, "I'm so sorry that happened to you." Surprisingly, he brushed it off with a shrug. No big deal. "God has a plan for me," he told me with confidence.

Wow. This guy's attitude is amazing, I thought! But then it hit me. His, "It's OK. Everything is going to work out," attitude wasn't just faith. I'd heard it before, in fact many times among the Karen people. It's a coping mechanism. They are so used to the rug being pulled out from under their feet, protecting themselves from the pain of their losses, betrayals, and powerlessness is how they survive.

Thank you for caring about all the oppressed, abused, and disadvantaged people we are serving in Myanmar and Thailand, especially among Karen and Karenni refugees. God has uniquely positioned us to teach, inspire, and encourage these brothers and sisters in Christ in many life-changing ways. Together, we are making a difference. Thank you for your prayers and support.

Update on the Crises in Southeast Asia and the Congo

Due to uncertainty over the future of US AID support for food, medicine, doctors, clinics, and hospitals, administrators in the nine refugee camps along the Thai-Myanmar border were forced to slash monthly rations once again, this time by 75% in some of the camps. In Mae La, the largest of the camps, the rations went from 310 Bahts (\$9.25)/month to 77 Bahts (\$2.30)/person/month.

Meanwhile, in Eastern Congo, millions of people are still coping with the fall of Goma and Bukavu to M23 rebels this winter. During the day, life is somewhat back to normal, but residents are living with a tremendous amount of fear and uncertainty. Evern night, lawlessness returns and violent thieves break into homes, stealing and sometimes killing randomly.

Thanks to the generosity of FHLGM donors, we have been able to deploy thousands of dollars of humanitarian aid to the refugee camps, to earthquake victims in Mandalay and surrounding regions, and to Eastern Congo. We are also distributing free books to pastors where possible, who will in turn pass them on others who can most benefit from them. Separately, Tim's biblical reflections, translated into French and Swahili, are reaching hundreds of thousands through Facebook.
